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About Rerural



The Group Works in Slovakia event was held in Bratislava, Slovakia between 01-03 December 2022. 11 participants travelled from Türkiye, 11 participants from Poland. 10 participants were selected locally. The event was attended by a total of 32 participants. The participants in the three events were selected from the fields of tourism, architecture, and landscape architecture. Undergraduate, postgraduate, and doctoral students, as well as faculty members as group leaders were among the participants.


Devin Castle Solutions

Hologram Projections (3D): Introduce hologram projections that use 3D technology to recreate historical scenes and events. Visitors can witness key moments in the castle's past, from royal gatherings to battles, through dynamic holographic displays. This cutting-edge approach adds a captivating and futuristic dimension to the historical narrative.





Information Boards in the Village: Install information boards at strategic locations in the village, providing details about its history, notable landmarks, and local points of interest. Include maps, historical timelines, and QR codes linking to digital resources. These boards serve as valuable navigational aids for visitors, encouraging them to explore the village and learn about its cultural heritage.

Improved Hiking Route with Interpretive Stations: Enhance the hiking route from the city center to the village by incorporating interpretive stations along the way. Culinary Experiences on the Trail: Collaborate with local establishments to set up pop-up culinary experiences along the hiking route. This not only supports local businesses but also enriches the overall hiking adventure.

Vajnory



Nestled in the embrace of Bratislava, Slovakia, Vajnory stands as a small district that defies the bustling urban archetype. Its landscape, dotted with family houses, echoes a tranquil ambiance, a departure from the concrete expanses found in larger urban areas like Petržalka. With an approximate population of 5000, Vajnory exudes the warmth of a close-knit community.

Despite its modest size, Vajnory holds claim to the title of the oldest airport in Slovakia. While no commercial airlines operate from here, the airport adds a unique touch to the village's character. For moments of relaxation, Vajnorské jazerá or Bager, a man-made lake, beckons locals and visitors alike during the summer. While the lake offers respite, it remains unembellished, providing a natural escape. Additionally, Zlaté piesky, known as Golden Sands, offers a water-centric recreational spot with sporting facilities, making it a favored destination for enthusiasts.
